Fatal Fecal Flings

NUBUTAUTAU, Fiji (Reuters) - The inhabitants of Nubutautau, a small village in Fiji, tearfully apologized last week to the descendants of Thomas Baker, a British missionary who was killed and eaten by their ancestors in 1867. In a complicated but surprisingly well-attended reconciliation ritual, 100 sperm whale teeth were given to Baker's great-great-great-grandchildren as a crowd of nearly 2,000 looked on. The villagers also returned several of Baker's personal effects, including his Bible, comb, and the soles of his boots (regrettably, the rest of Baker's boots could not be returned because, as is often the result of the rash nature of cannibals, they were consumed with Baker's body and "a dash of bele," a local vegetable). It is believed that Nubutautau's recent bad luck is due not to the fact that the village is both inaccessible to the outside world and practically devoid of vegetation, but rather because Baker's death and consumption resulted in particularly bad karma. The villagers are hopeful for the future, however; in the optimistic words of Tomasi Baravilala, the village spokesman, "Today we will be set free from the curse." If the ritual succeeds, the Nubutautau plan to launch a counter-curse franchise targeting ill-fated people everywhere from Third World countries to Fenway Park.

BUDAPEST (Reuters) - "Breathtaking!" "Revolutionary!" "A bold statement of postmodernism!" These are just a few of the comments garnered by a new sculpture at Budapest's University of Arts last week-that is, until students realized that it was actually not an "unprecedented stroke of surrealist genius," but the corpse of a man who had hanged himself over a year ago. The building in which the sculpture/ body hung/hanged had been closed for five years and recently reopened for renovation. Although some students were shaken by the incident, others appeared to draw great inspiration from the artfully dangling cadaver. The body was admired as art for a full day before its true nature was realized and the police notified.

OSLO (Reuters) – During a routine NATO military exercise, an error aboard a Dutch F-16 caused a bomb to drop less than 200 yards from three military observers. Although the accident itself surprised no one, the fact that there is such a thing as a Dutch F-16 did come as quite a shock to many. Luckily, Dutch jet-fighting being what it is, a second error prevented the 500-lb. bomb from detonating upon impact. The three would-be victims of the almost-bombing have each been offered counseling and a temporary supply of superior-grade cannabis to help them cope with the shock.



SINGAPORE (AP) – November 16th was annual World Toilet Day, and in celebration the WTO has kicked off an elaborate campaign to improve the status of the world's toilets and compile a comprehensive set of bathroom etiquette tips.
