

PITTSBURGH (Pittsburgh Post-Gazette): Ms. Courtney Mann, a tax preparer, single mother, and head of the Philadelphia chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of White People, was rebuffed after attempting to join a Ku Klux Klan-sponsored march in Pittsburgh in April 1997. Although she had been involved in the NAAWP for over four years, the Klan turned her down, not surprisingly, because of race: she's black. Said the Grand Dragon incredulously: "She wanted to stay at my house [during rally weekend]. She's all confused, man. I don't think she knows she's black." In reply, Ms. Mann retorted: "It's interesting that he said that, because I don't think he knows he's not a dragon."

JIDDA, SAUDI ARABIA (AP): The opening of the New Haven Ikea made waves in the Yale community, as Elis now have convenient access to Klippan sofas and bookcases Billy to replace the cardboard boxes that comprise their normal dorm room furnishings. But apparently Saudi Arabians like low-cost Scandinavian furniture even more than Yalies, and will kill to get it: at an opening of an outpost of the retail giant in Jidda a murderous mob of 8,000 vying for a limited promotional discount stampeded three people to death and injured seventeen more. LONDON (Edmonton Journal): It turns out insurance salespeople *are* all the same. Prosecutors have yet to determine whether the suspects had been yelling because they needed to flee the scene fast, or because they had both wanted to nail the girl themselves.



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
